volume reflects the commitment of scholars to the exploration of early modern women's culture as recovered through images, literature, music, and archives of the period. In essays on stories, goods, faiths, and pedagogues, scholars from a wide variety of fields discuss the contributions that reveal early modern women's influence on the societal and cultural transformations in which they participated. Nearly thirty workshops from the conference are summarized, and these offer a detailed overview of current research in early modern women's studies. An introduction by Margaret Mikesell traces the development of the attending to early modern women symposia, 1990-2000. A keynote address by Diane Purkiss on stories of maternal grief located in Scottish witch trial confessions is also included.

Psychology's study of women has revealed some themes that span cultures and countries, yet women's lived experiences in different cultures can be dramatically different. This element explores from a psychological perspective women's issues in cultural contexts, beginning with the question of public and private identity: i.e., who counts as a woman? It goes on to examine embodiment, sexuality, reproduction, family roles, economic participation, and power, violence, leadership, and feminist activism. It concludes with a brief discussion of women's complicated relationship to culture as both keepers and sometimes prisoners of cultural traditions, particularly in the context of migration to different cultures. Running through the element are two general themes: the pervasiveness of a gender hierarchy that often privileges men over women, and the ways in which women's lived experience varies within cultures according to the intersection of gender with other categories that affect expectations, norms, power, and privilege.

A new and major contribution to the field, *Women in European Culture and Society* is a transnational history of women in Europe from the beginning of the eighteenth century that pushes women's history beyond national studies to create an integrated view of three hundred years of women in Europe. Using a *longue durée*, the book disentangles the accounts of industrialisation and bourgeois femininity which tend to dominate women's studies and questions the dominant narratives of history, drawing on women's own writing and cultural production. It presents women as agents of change, as well as exploring cultural perceptions of women and the ways in which women have been represented by these discourses. It explicitly engages with how women contributed as practitioners to shaping the culture and society of Western Europe. The geographical range and generational breadth of this study provides a cohesive vision of women's lives up to the present day. *Women in European Culture and Society* is an invaluable and essential guide to the conditions, circumstances, and understandings of how women lived throughout Europe.

In the late nineteenth century, the Mormon culture region of the American West was considered radical, characterized by sexual immorality, communalism, and anti-Americanism. Today, social conservatism marks the region. How did this shift occur? In this unique study, Ethan R. Yorgason foregrounds the concept of region and traces the

conformist conservative trajectory that arose from intense moral and ideological clashes between mormons and non mormons from 1880 to 1920 non mormons worried that mormons would establish an un american society in the west while mormons feared for the very existence of their church an example of the new regional geography yorgason s work treats culture as an arena of political struggle looking through the lenses of regional geography history and cultural studies yorgason investigates shifting moral orders relating to gender authority economic responsibility and national loyalty he particularly focuses on mormon feminism communitarianism nationalism and home life transformation of the mormon culture region charts the cultural contradictions of both mormons and non mormons and how they were resolved over time by a progressive narrowing of the range of moral positions on gender in favor of victorian gender relations the economy in favor of individual economics and the nation identifying with national power and might mormons and non mormons together constructed a regime of effective coexistence while retaining regional distinctiveness

can moral disagreements be rationally resolved can universal human rights be defended in face of moral disagreements the problem of moral disagreement is one of the central problems in moral thinking it also provides a stimulating stepping stone to some of the perennial problems of philosophy such as relativism scepticism and objectivity moral disagreements is the first anthology to bring together classic and contemporary readings on this key topic clearly divided into five parts the historical debate voices from anthropology challenges to moral objectivity defenses of moral objectivity and new directions the anthology presents readings from the following key thinkers sextus empiricus chagnon wong macintyre aquinas shweder brink rawls montaigne turner nussbaum narayan hume mackie gewirth nietzsche williams berlin a distinctive feature of the anthology is that it brings philosophers into dialogue with well known anthropologists also included is a comprehensive introduction by christopher gowans introducing the problem of moral disagreement to those coming to the topic for the first time
